Description: This unit aims a) to introduce students to key theological concepts and principles undergirding evangelism; b) to familiarise students with a range of evangelistic contexts, methods and models; c) to equip students with basic skills in the communication of Christian faith.

Method: Classroom instruction, seminars, reading, exercises, observation and field work.

Assessment: Personal involvement (with supervision) in not less than 20 hours of specifically evangelistic programs, including 5 hours of direct evangelism together with:
for 223: One 1750 word essay + One Field study and report 1000 words + Presentation in class of a gospel outline equivalent to 750 words + 500 word journal on involvement in PTC Mission 2008.
for 324 (2cps): One Field study and report 1000 words + Presentation in class of a gospel outline equivalent to 750 words + 500 word journal on involvement in PTC Mission 2008..
for 324 (4cps): One 2000 word essay + One Field study and report 1000 words + Presentation in class of a gospel outline equivalent to 750 words + 500 word journal on involvement in PTC Mission 2008..

Note: It will be expected that all students enrolled in these units are actively involved in a PTC Mission in first semester.

Description:	A study of the consistent purpose of God as revealed in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments for the salvation of the world.
Method:	Lectures, reading and assignments.
Assessment:	One 2000 word exegetical paper, one 3000 word essay, class presentation.

EM775/489/689 Preaching Different Biblical Genres

Outline:

- a) Theological foundations of preaching
- b) Issues in contemporary society that influence the way we preach.
- c) Issues in the contemporary church that influence the way we preach.
- d) Appropriate models of preaching for today.
- e) Hermeneutical issues in preaching.
- f) Preaching differing biblical genres: the Law; Wisdom literature; the Prophets; the Gospels; the Epistles.
- g) Practical help in moving from text to sermon.
- h) Learning to let the text speak.
- i) Speaking the text through preaching.
- j) Preaching in a contemporary style.

Outcome:

At this end of the unit students should:

- 1) have a developed theology of Biblical preaching.
- 2) recognise the hermeneutical issues in preaching.
- 3) apply insights from hermeneutical issues identified to the biblical genres addressed in the unit.
- 4) adapt their preaching in the light of contemporary issues.
- 5) demonstrate ability in the practice of preaching

Method: Lectures, reading and assignments.

Assessment:

- 1) Three sermons reviewed (35%) from texts of at least two different Biblical genre:
 - one presented in class
 - one recorded in video and reviewed with lecturer
 - one preached as part of the students usual ministry involvement (if possible) and reviewed by minister of congregation (or equivalent) and by two members of the congregation. Each sermon will be

the equivalent of 1000 words of assessment. Students should submit their pulpit script (full text or points) for each sermon at the time of submitting the sermon for assessment.

- 2) Essay on hermeneutical and homiletical issues related to preaching the different biblical genres. 4000 words. (50%)
- 3) 1000 word book review of 500 pages of reading (15%) (This will be a pre-reading assignment when offered in intensive mode.)
